

Porous Things

Interweaving Boston Public Works with Boston public space

A 2024 Rotch Traveling Scholarship Final Competition Proposal

Inspired by the spirit of Cedric Price and Joan Littlewood's 1960s *Fun Palace*, a project designed, "to be erected on disused public land slated for redevelopment and intended to be dismantled after 10 years¹, *Porous Things* is designed as a "short term plaything" intended to activate the BPW site and to link the underutilized land to Boston's South End and Southie.

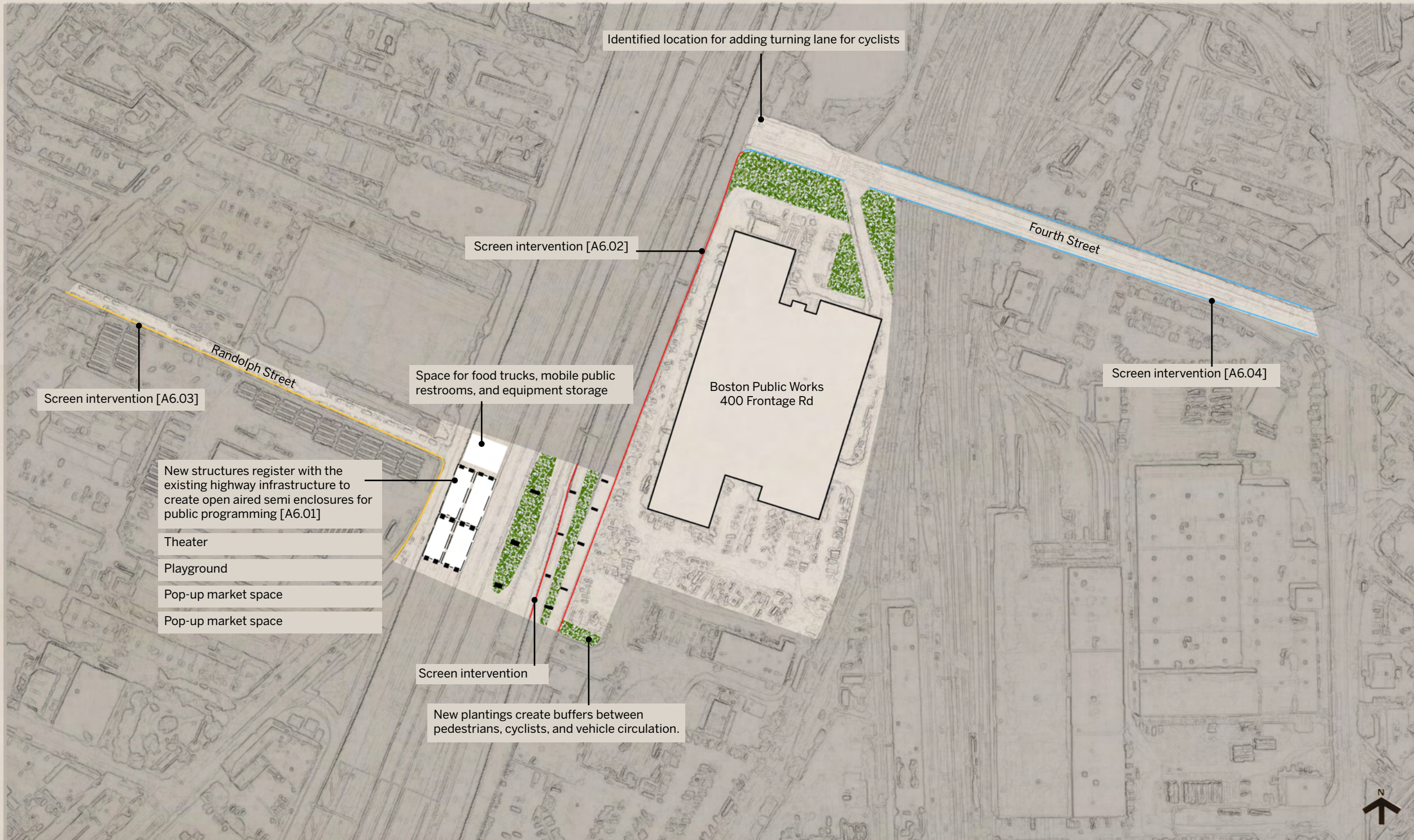
Nested volumes underneath I-93 are constructed from perforated metal panels, shielding visitors from the intense wind, illuminating dark, uninviting zones, and creating spaces large and flexible enough to accommodate bleacher seating for theatrical performances and rallies, in addition to dance parties, protests, community organizing, and futsal.

Porous Things improves the overall exterior appearance of the BPW facility, not by merely dressing up the building, but by curating views both into and through the site. Like Claes Oldenburg's *Proposals for Monuments and Buildings, 1965-69*, *Porous Things* takes elements from the everyday to the colossal, from the profile of tent like structures to the celebratory and commonly cut *papel picado*.

Porous Things guides the visitor's journey, inviting them into the site, signaling *this* is the space to activate, and gesturing that "it's up to you how you use it."

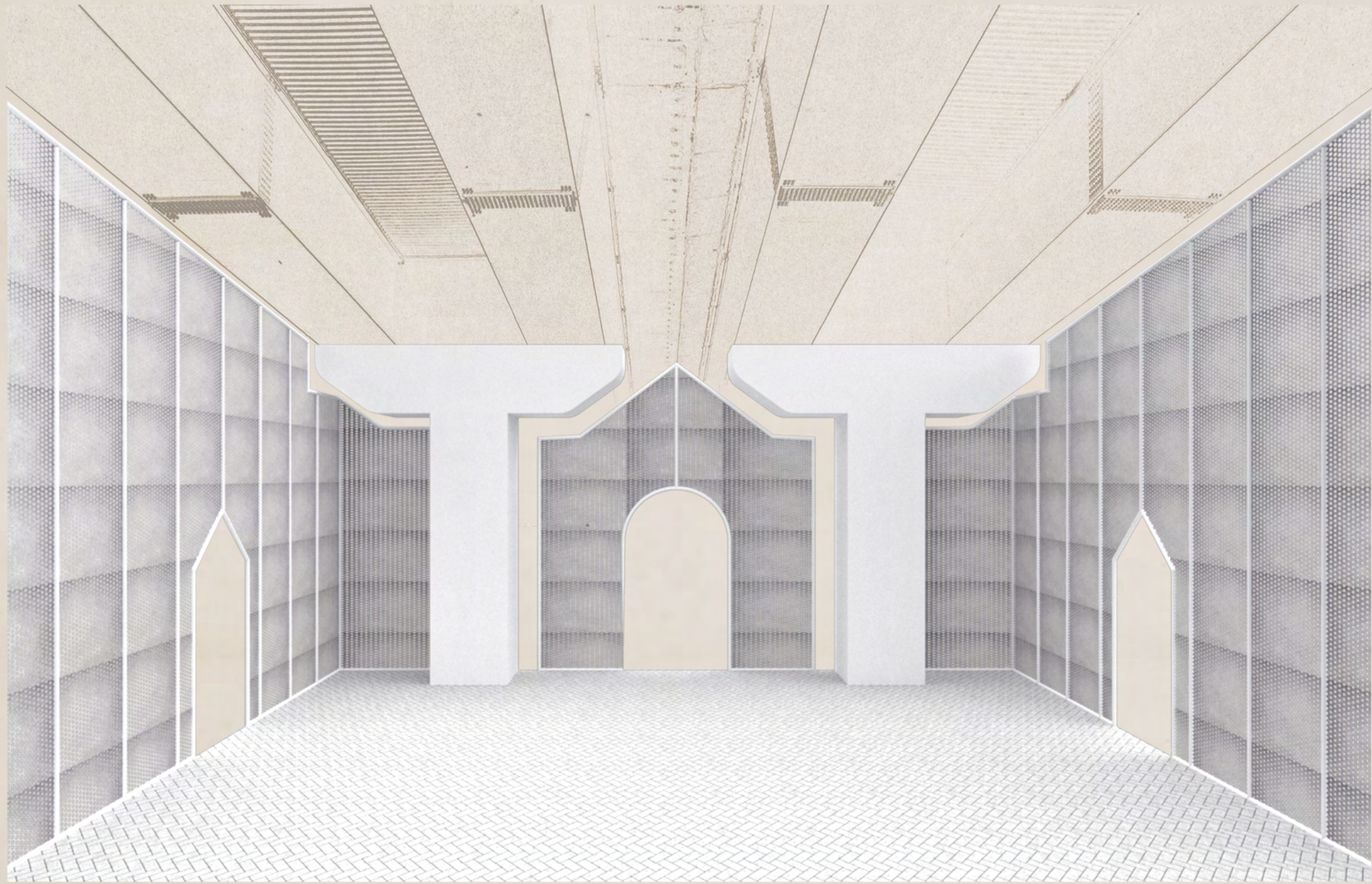

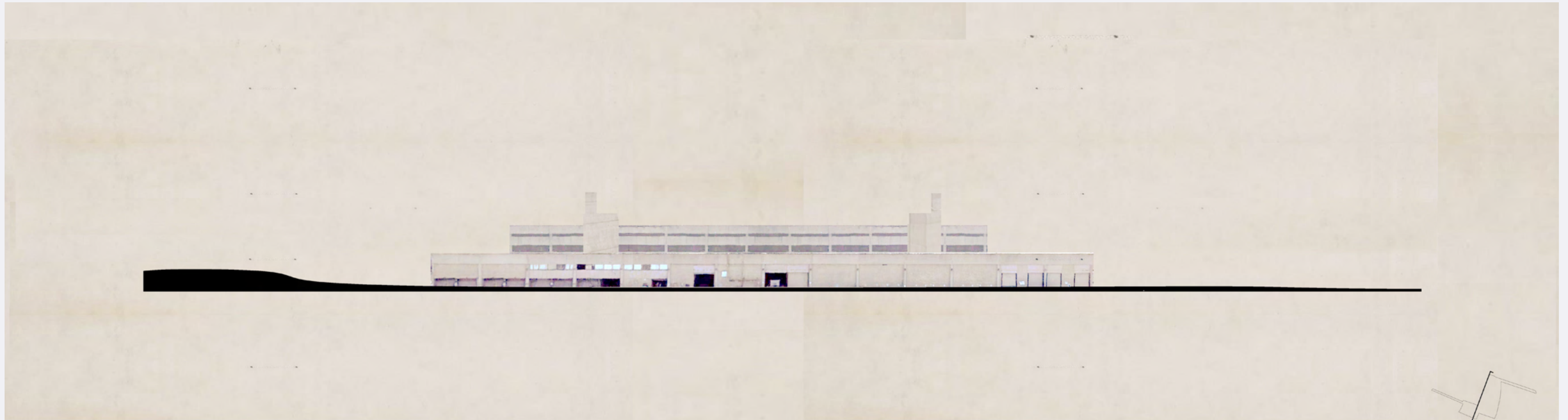

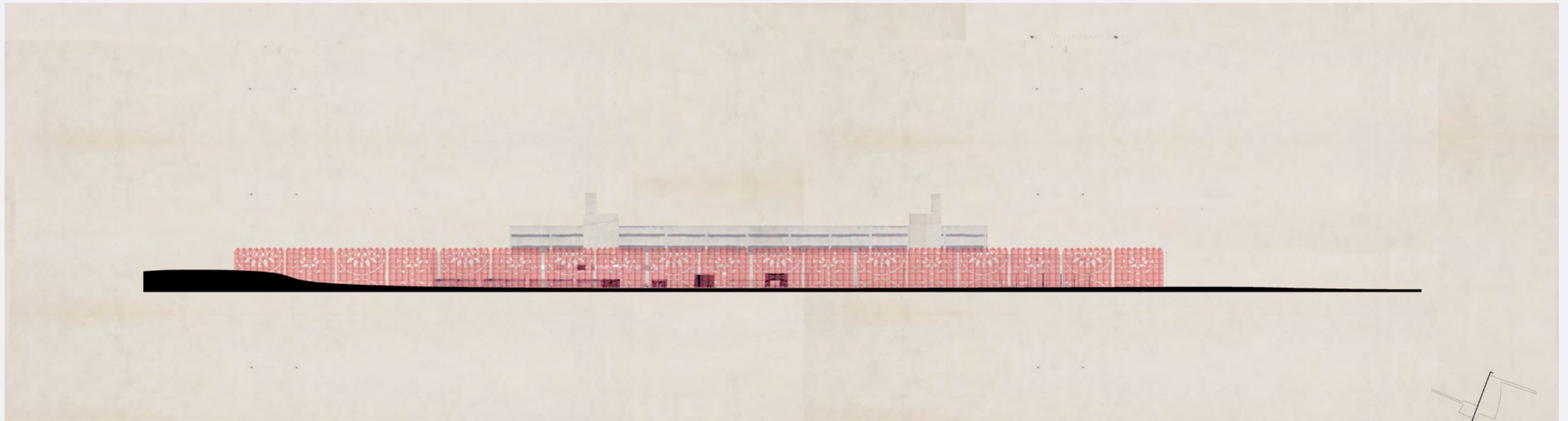
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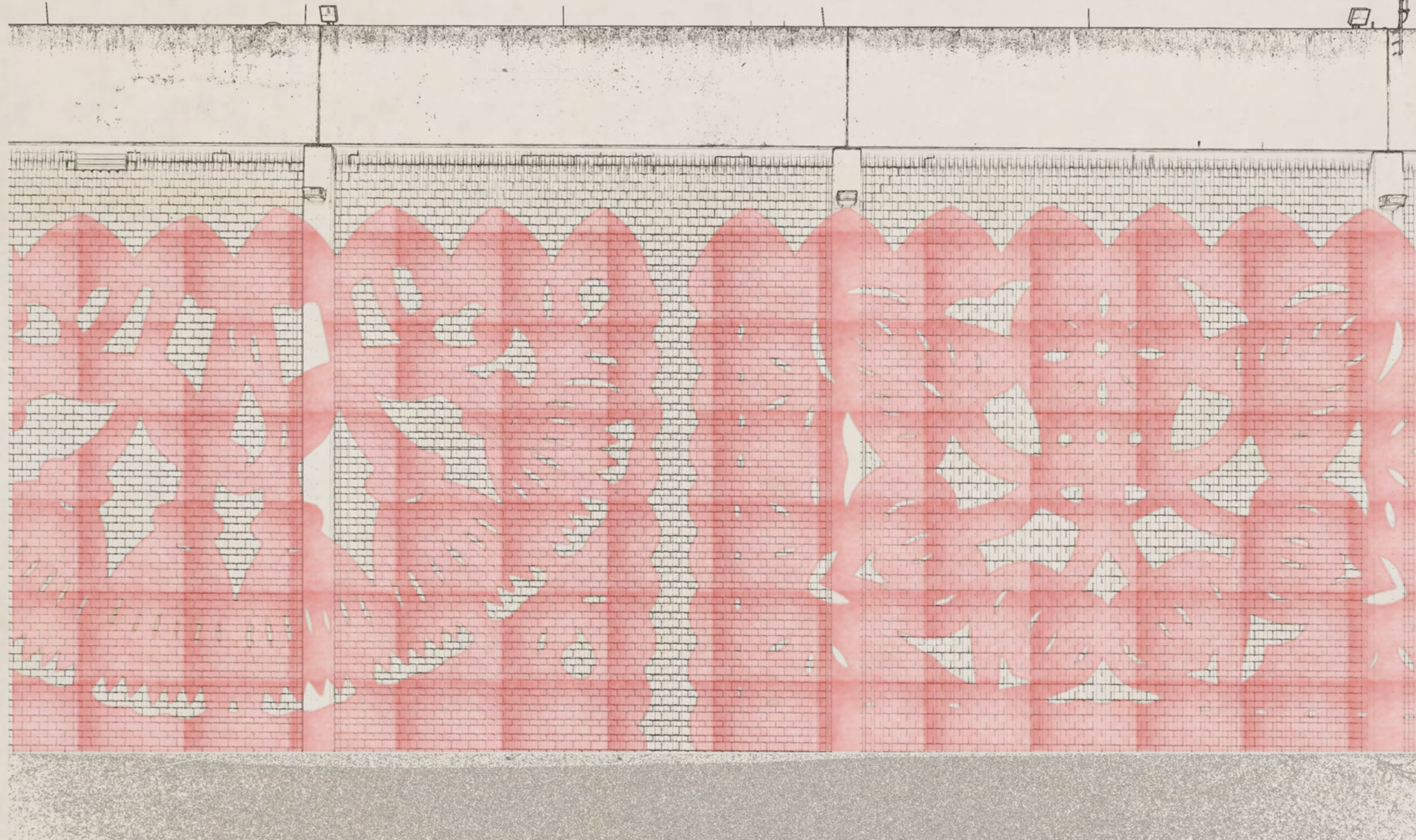

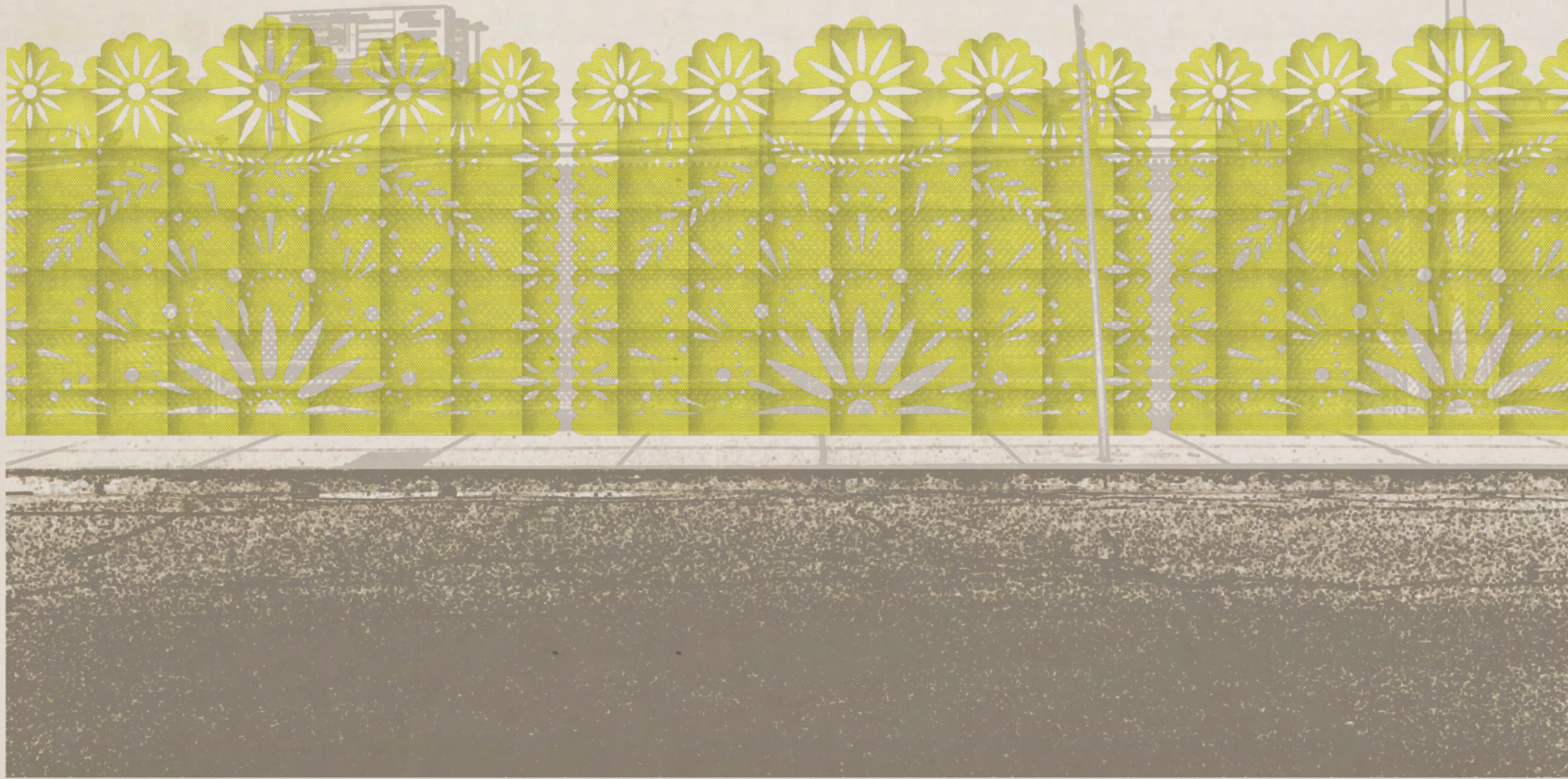
